Jeffrey J. Kripal holds the J. Newton Rayzor Chair in Philosophy and Religious Thought at Rice University, where he is also the Chair of the Department of Religious Studies. He received his B.A. in Religion from Conception Seminary College in 1985 and his Ph.D. in the History of Religions from the University of Chicago in 1993. He is the author of Esalen: America and the Religion of No Religion (Chicago: University of Chicago Press, 2007), The Serpent's Gift: Gnostic Reflections on the Study of Religion (Chicago: University of Chicago Press, 2006), Roads of Excess, Palaces of Wisdom: Eroticism and Reflexivity in the Study of Mysticism (Chicago: University of Chicago Press, 2001), and Kali's Child: The Mystical and the Erotic in the Life and Teachings of Ramakrishna (Chicago: University of Chicago Press, 1995).
